

New Report Finds Libraries Help Close Digital Divide but


Struggle to Sustain Public Access Computing Services

"The challenge now is to continue providing this access that millions of our neighbours depend upon."


Global Libraries program works to support the transformation of libraries as engines of development.






The American Library Association's Digital Inclusion Survey, found that nearly all of the nation's public libraries provide their communities with computers, Wi-Fi, vast online resources and technology skills training.

The report, however, also found a stark divide among some of the digital resources available at libraries.





Number of Offline Households in Catchment

Can libraries fill the gap?

The average 16+ internet user in Scotland spends over 50 hours per month online at home plus 30 h/m elsewhere.

If each household without home internet requires library access for one hour per month, a library serving 5,200 offline households must provide 1,200 access hours per week
